President's Message

This is a direct plea to members of the Society to consider serving on the Long Range Planning Committee. We need dedicated individuals who see the value in making sure our Society remains strong and viable, to explore and make recommendations to the board and membership for our future.

Several years ago, the Long Range Planning Committee had the vision to see that the Society needed



to look down the road, not by one or two years but five to fifteen years, in order for our Society to stay viable. To this end they felt we needed to have a way to set aside funds for the eventual needs of the Society. The Long Range Planning Committee recommended that the board approve to have a "Nonprofit Reserve"

Fund" created at the Arizona Community Foundation. In 2011, the Society signed the agreement and began transferring the majority of the previous mortgage payment to the Arizona Community Foundation Account for our future use. We continue today to make this transfer monthly.

Now we need to review the 2010 recommendations, take a look at where we are now, and plan for the next 5-15 years. I can't tell you how important it will be for this committee to review and continue the work of the previous Long Range Planning Committee. 

We were pleased to recognize Leona Goodhart for her many years of volunteering with the Society. She passed away on March 24 and her absence is already being felt. She grew up in MN where she married her husband of 57 years, Kermit (known as Goody). They raised three daughters who are now spread around the US. She was



employed as a pharmacist in MN, a job she continued after they moved to Sun Village in Surprise.

In her spare time, she enjoyed planning vacations for the family, sometimes to battlefields and sometimes to places connected to their genealogy. One year she took her three daughters to Norway to "meet the relatives." A trip they will never forget.

Leona joined the Society in 1986 and for the next nearly 18 years was active in many different areas. She was very involved in research in Norway and Sweden and helped lead that SIG. Her family noted that she had spent much of her time recently writing her stories to complete their family tree.

She volunteered as the Library Saturday morning opener for several years. When asked if she wouldn't like to work another shift she replied, "No, this is how I get Goody to take me out to breakfast." She was one of the proof readers for the *Desert Tracker* whose skills will be deeply missed as she never missed a misspelling or an errant comma. As part of the Long Range Planning Group, she had an important part in securing and moving into this building so the Society could keep expanding. Perhaps what will be missed the most will be her anonymous donation of wrapped candy for the front desk. Suddenly, a morning aide would show up and there would be a bag of candy on her chair with no note or ID as to who left it there. It was a very long time (perhaps years) before it was discovered who was providing the goodies.

The Way I Heard It
